## **GAPS & Issues**

Services in Randolph County are primarily intervention programs and the majority of youth are in court with no prior adjudications. Sex Offender Treatment, while the needs are small in numbers, the need is an important need that has to be met. Substance Abuse is another service that is important to meet the needs of juvenile court youth. Youth also have significant school behavior problems with short or long term suspensions or unexcused absences.

**Proposed Program Services should target the following Risk Factors for Delinquency or Repeat Delinquency:**

**Adjudicated delinquent, undisciplined or youth at high risk of delinquency who: have prior referrals to juvenile court, have some substance abuse or use, have moderate or serious school behavior problems, sometimes or regularly associate with delinquent peers, or associate with or are gang members and have parents who are unable to supervise their children.**

**Programs should address the following concerns as reported in the Needs Assessments for adjudicated youth:**

Peer Domain: **Lack pro-social peers, associate with delinquents peers or who have gang association or membership.**

Individual Domain: **Have some use or abuse of drugs or alcohol, have a history of abuse or neglect, have dangerous sexual behaviors or victimization of others or are in need of further mental health assessments.**

Family Domain: **Have families with domestic discord/violence, parents with marginal/inadequate parenting skills, family members who abuse alcohol/drugs or have family members with a criminal history or gang.**

School Domain: **Have moderate to serious school behavior problems ( truancy, disciplinary problems, short or long term suspensions, dropped out or expelled)**

**Applicants are being sought that are able to address items below:**

1. Program services compatible with research that are shown to be effective with juvenile offenders.
2. Program services are outcome-based.
3. The program has an evaluation component.
4. Program services detect gang participation and divert individuals from gang participation.

**Local public agencies, 501(c)(3) non-profit corporations and local housing authorities are invited to submit applications to provide services addressing the above elements.**
